Chapel of the Ascension



In Jerusalem, several churches commemorate the Ascension of Jesus into heaven. One of the most popular is the Chapel of the Ascension, located on top of the Mount of Olives. A Byzantine church in honor of the Ascension was constructed on this site about 390 A.D. by a Christian woman named Poimenia. The open-air church was said to contain a stone with the imprint of the foot of Jesus.

The Persians destroyed the church about 614 A.D., but it was later restored by St. Modestus of Jerusalem. Crusaders rebuilt the church about 1150, but by the end of the 12th century, the Muslim general, Saladin, had captured the church and converted it into a mosque.


The chapel remains a holy site for Christians and for Muslims who also acknowledge the Ascension of Jesus and will continue to occupy the site. The walls in the courtyard of the Chapel of the Ascension are lined with hooks. Pilgrims used the hooks to stretch tents when they came to celebrate the Feast of the Ascension.

Financial Status at March 31, 2022

Our adjusted bank balance at March 31, 2022 is the following:

anticipated expenses of \$141,277. This means we expect to spend \$16,302 more than we receive. This is the last year we can do this. We have been using prior years' accumulated funds to meet current year's needs, and those funds will be fully exhausted at this year end.

Contributions for the first three months for the year look good when compared to the budget. If we are able to adhere closely to our budget, then the year end result would be as follows:

"Of Birds and Stars"


Nature teaches us much about God. For one thing, it shows His kindness in providing animals and birds with inborn impulses and patterns that aid them in adjusting to what is often a hostile environment. Their lives are thus guided and preserved despite their limited intelligence. For instance, some birds would die if they had to stay all year in areas of extremely cold weather. Therefore, the Lord has graciously given them migrating instincts.

Take, for instance, the small indigo bunting (a member of the finch family). This little guy apparently steers his way 2,000 miles south every year just by looking over his shoulder at the northern sky! This night-flying bird does not seem to rely on any one star or constellation for his direction, says Stephen T. Emlen of Cornell University. Rather, this bird recognizes the whole geometrical pattern of the skies within 35 degrees of the North Star, and it can be confused only when that part of the sky is entirely blocked off by clouds. The bunting then wisely discontinues flight until it can once again get a clear view of the configuration made by the northern star groups.

The prophet Jeremiah tells us that the Lord gave these "ordinances of the moon and

the stars for a light by night" (Jeremiah 31:35). Apparently, the nighttime lights not only aid people in navigation but they also assist our feathered friends, the birds.

Observing nature, so crammed with beauty, wonder, and design, we can see through the lives of the beasts and the fowls of the air that there is a gracious heavenly Father who provides for His creatures in wisdom. This in turn should call forth our adoration and praise!



History of Memorial Day

On May 5, 1858, three years after the Civil War ended, the leader of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR), an organization of Union veterans, established Decoration Day as a time for the nation to decorate with flowers the graves of those who died in the war. Major General John A. Logan declared that Decoration Day be observed on May 30. It is believed that the end of May was chosen because spring flowers would be available, and the first large observance of this day was held in 1858 at Arlington National Cemetery. Ceremonies took place around the veranda of the Arlington mansion, once the home of General Robert E. Lee. Washington officials, including General and Mrs. Ulysses S. Grant, presided over the ceremonies.

It was not until after World War I, however, that Memorial Day was expanded to honor those who had died in all American wars. In December 2000, President Clinton signed The National

Moment of Remembrance Law, which was passed by congress to encourage all Americans to pause wherever they are at 3:00 p.m. local time on Memorial Day for a minute of silence to remember and honor those who have died in service to the nation.

Special services to honor those who had died in war date back to antiquity. Pericles, the Athenian statesman offered a tribute to the fallen heroes of the Peloponnesian War over 24 centuries ago that could be applied to the 1.1 million Americans who have died in our nation's wars when he said, Not only are they commemorated by columns and inscriptions, but there dwells also an unwritten memorial of them, graven not on stone but in the hearts of men."



Uldine Utley is defined the girl evangelist of the 1920s and 1930s. She began her preaching career at age eleven, published a monthly magazine by age twelve, and by age fourteen was regularly packing the largest venues in major American cities, including Carnegie Hall and Madison Square Garden. She stood toe to toe with Billy Sunday and Aimee Semple McPherson, the most famous revivalist preachers of the day. She became a darling of the secular press and was mimicked and modeled in fiction and plays. With a career as a girl evangelist of over a dozen years, she spend the latter half in the Chicago area.
